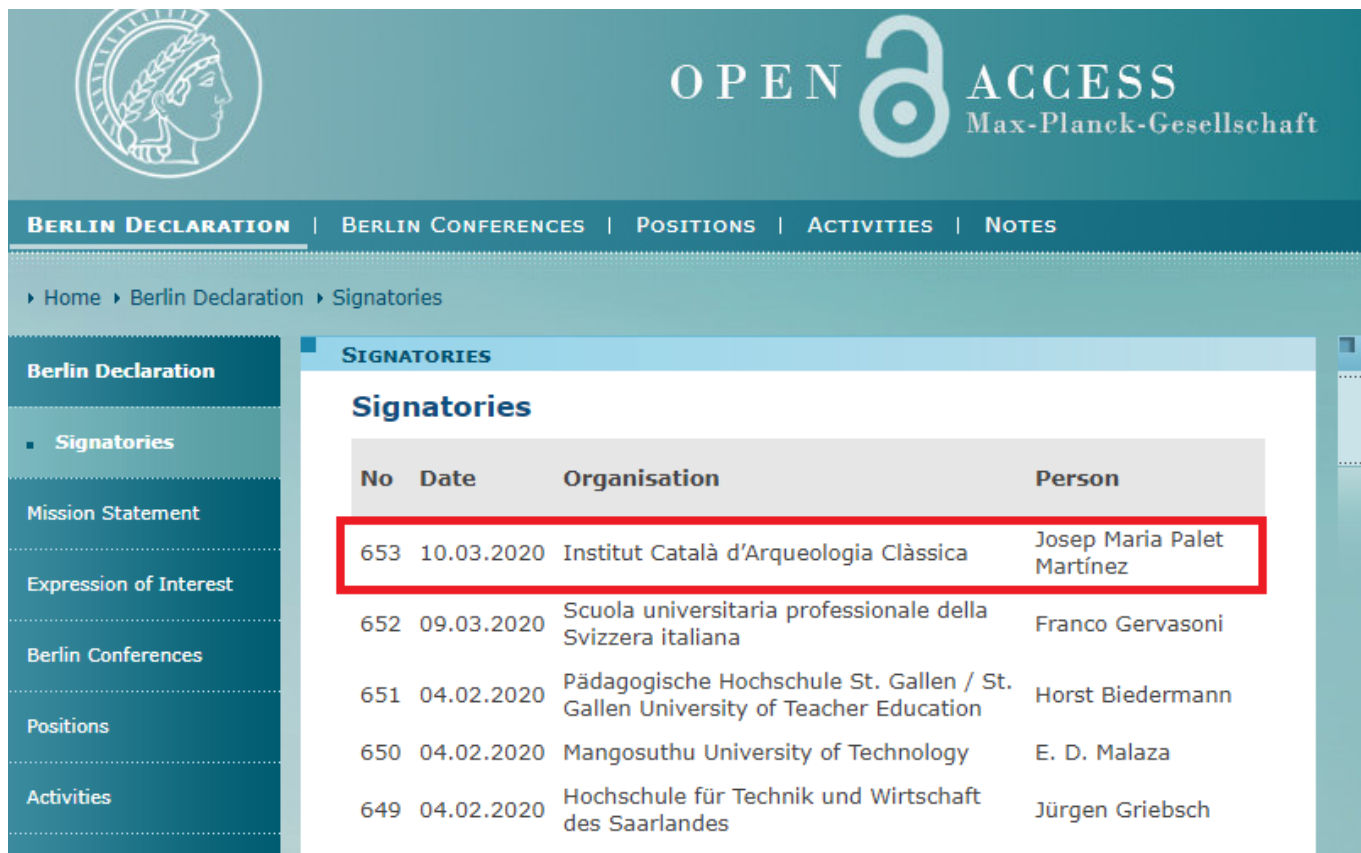


ICAC is a new signatory of the Berlin Declaration on Open Access to Knowledge in Sciences and Humanities

Since March 10, 2020, ICAC is part of the **more than 650 institutions around the world** that have signed the **Berlin Declaration on Open Access to Knowledge in Sciences and Humanities**, one of the most emblematic documents of the Open Access Movement led by the Max Planck Society.

With this adhesion ICAC takes a further step in its institutional commitment to boost open access to scientific production, a commitment that is already present in the Institute's **Open Access Policy** (2015) and that is reflected in its participation in the **Research Catalan Gateway (Portal de la Recerca de Catalunya)** and in the Catalan cooperative repository **Recercat**.
